President's Message

Embracing Change - Hope 2.0, the Next Generation



e are on the threshold of the most exciting days in the history of Hope International University. Not since the decision in 1973 to move from a small campus in Long Beach to our current location in Fullerton, have we had the kind of opportunities that lie before us now. In my conversations with those who were a part of that experience, they reflected on the anticipation and excitement generated by such a courageous (and controversial) venture under the leadership of President Medford Jones. Mrs. Bertha Henry Taylor, who will be 100 years old on December 1 and was the first woman to chair the Board of Trustees, shared with me some of the discussions that took place in the board meetings. Back then, some wondered about the wisdom of having a college across the street from a state university. Others, like the late Gene Carter who established our first degree completion program, considered it one of the best things that could have happened to the school.

Due diligence is the process of investigating, evaluating, and analyzing alternatives before reaching a decision. It weighs advantages and disadvantages, considers risk factors, and ultimately reaches a conclusion. Sometimes that process takes more time than we would prefer,

but it is necessary before committing to a specific direction. For several years we have been exploring options regarding the location of our main campus. We looked at a number of very attractive sites but were not met with a clear sense of affirmation. Our due diligence has been undergirded with prayer and an unwavering dedication to making a decision that honors God and demonstrates Christian stewardship of our resources.

In recent months several major developments transpired that led us to what we are confident is the right decision. Here is the path we have chosen.

- Our traditional residential campus will remain in Fullerton and will be located in the heart of a dynamic new master-planned community known as CollegeTown. Be sure to read more about the bold undertaking in this issue of Inside HIU. It will be a mixed-use development with new housing for students, faculty, and staff and will provide a college-friendly environment where residents can live, work, shop, dine and play. The first phase is already underway on the south side of our campus.
- The HIU Graduate Education Center in Orange, CA will be relocated to a site in Anaheim with excellent freeway access just ten minutes east of our main campus. Eastside Christian Church in Fullerton has sold their existing building and new facilities are currently under construction on a 20 acre property. It includes an existing six-story office building where we will lease newly renovated classroom and office space. We have outgrown our current facilities in Orange and this location will have room to expand plus an abundance of parking. The Hope Counseling Center will also be at this campus and we anticipate a valuable ministry and educational relationship with the church.
- We will increase our church partnerships by opening Ministry Training Institutes in strategic locations in the U.S. through our School of Advanced Leadership Training (SALT). Already several sites are in full operation providing accredited courses leading to ministry certificates that may be applied to an undergraduate or graduate degree.
- As a leader in online Christian higher education with state-of-the-art technology, we will continue to explore new opportunities to make learning accessible to those who are unable to attend classes on campus. Hundreds of students are already taking advantage of the online associate, bachelors, and master's degrees offered by HIU.

Change is not something we shy away from at HIU. We are an innovative school, always looking for ways to be more effective. Just as Apple improves iPhones and iPads with added features, or Microsoft releases new versions of computer software, we want to remain open to continually doing a better job of fulfilling our mission. You might think of what's happening today as Hope 2.0, the Next Generation. We've restructured into five colleges and designed a new logo to reflect our campus architecture. We've established more education centers and partnerships and plan to begin offering doctorate degrees in the near future. We've added the latest information technology and library learning resources to meet the needs of our students. We are undertaking our first Capital Campaign in 10 years to help underwrite the cost of the campus improvements and program expansion.

As we look to the future with excitement and anticipation of what God has in store, we are firmly anchored to our heritage in the Restoration Movement. I wholeheartedly believe that HIU belongs to the churches. It is your school and it exists to educate and equip outstanding leaders who will make a positive difference in the world. The excellent education our students receive is reflected in the success of our alumni. They consistently remind us that it was the relationships with the wonderful people at HIU that shaped their lives the most. And that is one quality of our university that will not change.

Unveiling Our New Logo

ope International University (HIU) is pleased to announce the release of its new logo. The logo celebrates HIU's rich history, dating back to 1928, while embracing the future including innovative programs that will meet the needs of individuals in the 21st century.

Michael Mulryan, Vice President for Institutional Advancement comments, "We are all very excited with the design and how the symbolism in the icon brings together HIU's identity. The new university icon incorporates our unique campus architecture, symbolizes the commitment to remain and develop our main campus in Fullerton and, most importantly, clearly identifies us as a Christian university."

The icon is a depiction of the building roofline on the Fullerton main campus. The buildings were designed in the iconic Googie style, an architectural style first made popular in the U.S. between the 1930s and the 1960s. Over the years, the uniqueness of these buildings has become near and dear to many who consider themselves a part of the HIU community – both to staff and faculty, current students and past students.

Centered within the logo is a cross, highlighting the University's commitment to preparing Christ-centered learners. The cross was modeled after a design by acclaimed artist and architectural sculptor, Randall E. Secrest.

"The new logo combines imagery depicting HIU's heritage with a contemporary design reflecting the University's status and vision of being a top-tier Christian educational institution. We have some exciting plans to merchandise, market and brand the new logo on campus, with our constituents and within the local community," says Mulryan. "The new logo is just one of many positive events occurring in what is a wonderfully exciting time in the University's history. With the restructuring of the five new colleges in place, construction beginning on the new student housing project south of the campus, the increase in enrollment, growing our relationship with Dongseo University and with HIU partnering in the CollegeTown development project with the City of Fullerton and CSU Fullerton, we have been truly blessed and feel the future is brighter than ever."

LAURIE POLICH SHORT Speaker, Author, Pastor

hen you're in college, one of the burning questions on your mind is: 'What is God's will for my life?''' said Christian author and speaker Laurie Polich Short as she helped the audience address this question when she spoke on September 23. Short also serves as Pastor of Small Groups and Discipleship at Ocean Hills Covenant Church in Santa Barbara and speaks on behalf of the non-profit organization Compassion International.

"When we're thinking God's will, we're often thinking future. What am I going to do with my life? Who am I going to be with?" On the latter subject, Short poked fun at her relationship experiences, which included having her fiancé break off their engagement to remarry his ex-wife. She expressed her confusion and frustration at watching so many other couples live "happily ever after" while she was still wondering what and who God had in store for her. Though it took her many years, Short said she finally realized that we get far too caught up in trying to figure out God's will, when what we should be doing is acting justly and letting God guide us in the right direction.

"The great thing about acting justly is you are not alone," she said. "You walk with a big God and you never know what he is going to do with the stories you get involved with." She reminded the audience that even though problems may seem too complicated for us to solve, we can make a difference. She touched on the sad reality that many of us want to help solve world issues but we allow ourselves to be overwhelmed by the complexities and size of the problem. "Because we feel like we can't do everything, we do nothing," Short said. "But again I want to say you guys, God just expects us to do something."

She pointed out that there are opportunities to help others in the Orange County area and nearby Los Angeles, as well as internationally. "So never think that you're at the end, because you don't know what God has around the corner."



VICTOR MARX Martial Arts Master, Speaker, Author

ollege students can be a tough crowd to impress, but Victor Marx, a master of martial arts, had no problem holding the audience's attention on February 17. He started by showing what he could do by demonstrating a few classic moves, including disarming a volunteer. Combined with his Cajun accent, the demonstration helped Marx immediately captivate the audience. He is the founder of "All Things Possible," a ministry that helps troubled youths nationwide, and author of With God, All Things Are Possible: The Victor Marx Story. Marx focuses primarily on children and teens in juvenile hall, which he affectionately and literally refers to as "the toughest youth group in the nation."

Reading from Psalms 31, Marx spoke on the grace and goodness of God, especially in his own life. "People admire you for your success, but they relate to you because of your pain." Marx had plenty of pain to share. His parents divorced before he was born, and his father refused to acknowledge that Marx was his son. As a child growing up in the backwoods, he was brutally attacked by a pedophile and nearly died. He was also routinely molested and tortured by his step-father. Soon the young Marx was diagnosed with Post Traumatic Stress Disorder.

After surviving his traumatic childhood, Marx joined the U. S. Marine Corp and studied martial arts, all the while trying to become as hard and untouchable as possible, before he was called to Christ through the most unlikely source: his biological father. Marx was stunned when his father contacted him to say that he had dedicated his life to Christ and wanted Marx to come to church with him. Miraculously, Marx agreed to go, and on that same trip, at the age of 20, he repented of his sins and accepted Christ, and he continues to serve God to this day. He readily admits that life can be rough and that it is not unusual to feel so burdened with hardships, temptation, and sin that you end up living a life in bondage. But he impressed on the audience that this is not the life we are meant to live.

"I hope you understand that your times are in the hands of the Lord," said Marx. Despite any uncertainty, anxiety or fears, Marx said, we must always trust in God because he will continue to strengthen us when we feel weak and give us courage when we are lacking confidence.



GENE APPEL Pastor, Speaker, Author

In his chapel address on November 18, Gene Appel, Pastor at Eastside Christian Church Fullerton, played a wordassociation game with the audience. "Oprah?" he shouted. "Money!" they responded. "George Clooney?" "Actor." "Taylor Swift?" "Singer." For "Gene Appel?" he gave his own response: "The guy with the funny voice that sounds like he has been inhaling helium for two days." Though he hopes people also associate him with terms like compassionate and teacher, he conceded that it was unlikely his name was synonymous with love. With that in mind, Appel asked the audience, "What do you want to be known for? What do you want your legacy to be?" His follow-up question was the kicker, "What is the legacy that matters?" The answer is simple: love.

The problem is that the more we focus on getting to "the big time," the more we tend to become anesthetized to the complex problems in the world, said Appel. He admitted to being guilty of this until six years ago, when he traveled internationally and met people living in areas where there were high levels of need. When he saw firsthand how great their needs were, Appel was filled with shame and regret at having taken so long to be moved into action. This experience pushed him to urge the audience not to live apathetic lives. He reminded them that chances to display and emulate "beyond me" love are everywhere, from down the street to across the world. Appel pointed to Luke 7, where Jesus demonstrates "that 'beyond me' kind of love is not complicated. It's just doing what you can with what you have when the opportunity comes your way."

According to Appel, we get so caught up in our busy lives and schedules we can easily miss or dismiss the small opportunities we have to act out of love. When we are coming from "the big time" or we are a "big deal," we lose sight of the ways we are supposed to stop and help others. But Christ, who was routinely a "big deal," never failed to stop. "For someone who had a physical need, for someone who was hurting, for someone who was lost," Appel said, "Jesus stopped and expressed 'beyond me' kind of love."

arly into his speech on January 20, Jeff Vines, Pastor at Christ Church of the Valley, asked, "How can I communicate the gospel in effective ways to a people who don't believe in God, who definitely don't believe in the Bible, or in Christ?" Many would say that the solution is to do good deeds, but Vines challenged this notion. There are plenty of decent, caring people who are not religious, he said, so as Christians we have to do more than be kind and compassionate; we have to take proactive steps to help people understand and realize the gospel and the goodness of Christ.

To illustrate his point, Vines told a story about being in Australia (considered to be one of the most atheistic countries in the world) and getting invited to dinner with a group of hotel employees. "You know how you walk into a room and you know that everybody's been talking about you? When I got there, I knew," he said. Vines managed to get two sips of Diet Coke before he realized that *he* was "the entertainment for the night." His dinner companions wanted to quiz him about Christianity and disprove his faith by lobbing increasingly difficult scenarios at him, but Vines took them all in stride. In fact, he was ecstatic at the opportunity. "Free food and we get to talk about my favorite topic: God," he recalled. "So this was turning out to be a great evening."

He eventually concluded the dinner discussion by saying, "You will never have joy in your life as a Christ follower until you understand the depth of grace, until you understand that God's acceptance of you is not based on how good you were today or yesterday or last year. But God's acceptance is based on what Jesus did on the cross two thousand years ago."

Vines encouraged the audience to examine their faith and be ready to defend it. "Everybody that's here is expecting a lot from your generation," he said. "To us, you are the ones that are going to go out and change and transform the world, but you've got to know something. It's not just good enough to be good enough. You've got to be able to give a reason for the faith and hope that is within you."



AMBERLY NEESE Speaker, Professor, Author

I t did not take long for Amberly Neese to win over the audience when she spoke on November 4. An author, speaker, and professor in the Masters of Education department at Grand Canyon University, Neese spoke on Psalm 62:8 and Zephaniah 3:17, which call us to trust in God and his might. While her message was certainly poignant, it was Neese's animated speaking style that instantly endeared her to the audience. Her language was peppered with catchy words and phrases like "delicious," "holy macaroli," "supersonic," and "cup of awesomeness."

Many of her stories were accompanied by wild, comical gestures and exaggerated accents. When she told the story of preaching in front of a predominantly African-American church, she said that was when she learned God is not just mighty: he is "*migh-tay*," a concept that struck a chord with her. "I never looked at God as the one who could do immeasurably more than I could ask or imagine," Neese confessed. "I just thought of him as the God who could take care of business, which is great. But I need a '*migh-tay*' God."

Despite any pressure or stress in our lives, Neese said we should live with "reckless abandon" for God because he will always provide for us. Drawing on the verse in Psalms, Neese challenged everyone in the audience to unburden themselves. "David is saying trust in [God] at all times, people, pour out your hearts to God. Give him everything," she urged. "Give him your dating life, give him your finances, give him your familial situation, give him your roommate. I know some of you are like, 'You can take my roommate,' but give him that situation. 'Pour out your hearts to him, for God is our refuge.'"

As her allotted speaking time came to a close, a rare moment of stillness descended on the auditorium and Neese did not waste it. "You may feel like you're alone, but you are not alone. Not only do you have a Holy Spirit that guides and directs, but you have a group of people around you," she said. "God is pouring himself into us and we can then offer ourselves as a sacrifice to him, and part of that will mean coming alongside other people and allowing other people to come alongside us."

Hunter is a published author and founder of the organizations Churches for the Sake of Others and Three is Enough.



That night, Michael proposed to Bethany and they married in September 2010. The Allens' are thrilled with the direction their lives are taking but, for a brief moment last year, things did not seem so perfect.

In December 2010, Michael was working for Marvel Comics as a Design Coordinator while Bethany was working as an Assistant Manager for the clothing retailer, New York and Company. Out of the blue, Michael was laid off. Feeling stunned and discouraged, he went back to his desk and prayed that God would help him understand where he was supposed to be and what he was supposed to do. Forty minutes later, in the middle of his prayers, Michael's phone rang. It was Campus Crusade for Christ International (CCCI) offering Michael a job heading up its film ministry at the University Arkansas.

About the same time that Michael was receiving his layoff notice, Bethany's brother-in-law was in a CCCI staff meeting. During a discussion about implementing a CCCI film ministry, he mentioned that Michael would be a great candidate for the job but was unlikely to accept the offer because he was currently working at Marvel. CCCI decided to call anyway, and Michael was all too happy to take the position. That night, Bethany was offered a position in the CCCI women's ministry.

Founded at UCLA in 1951, CCCI is active on 1,140 college campuses across the nation and also has bases established internationally, all for the purpose of bringing the gospel into people's lives. On campuses, that means introducing students to the Christian message and developing leaders through regular meetings, study groups, film screenings, and other events. In 2012, the organization's name will officially become "Cru" in the U.S., a name many campus ministries have already adopted since the mid-1990s.

Michael's job centers on putting together a team of students to make films reflecting what students are learning about Christ and Christianity. CCCI hopes to send Michael and his team to Thailand or Ethiopia next summer to make a documentary on CCCI's international presence. Throughout the year, Michael will also make CCCI promotional videos, lead Bible studies, and mentor male students. Meanwhile, Bethany will mentor upper division (Junior and Senior) female students so that they can, in turn, mentor Freshmen and Sophomores. She will also lead a weekly women's Bible study and help coordinate events and meetings. Michael and Bethany's first weekly meeting featured 600 students, and two weeks ago, CCCI's bible study kick off had 250 students in attendance. The Allens' are excited to experience a culture in Arkansas that is very different from what they are accustomed to in California, and they look forward to serving God by doing what they love. This Traveling Poet Speaks the

osanna Wong (B.A. '11) is living proof that when we let God take the reins, we just might end up in places beyond our dreams. In May 2011, Wong graduated from Hope International University (HIU) with a bachelor's degree in English Literature. A few years prior, Wong had burst onto the Hope community's radar with her Together with fellow students **Nathan McWherter (BA '11)** and **Danny Sugimoto ('12)**, Wong founded Spit in the Mud, a spoken word ministry dedicated to reaching out through poetry and art. Spit in the Mud traveled across cities, counties, and states to perform and minister to people through their pieces. In November 2010, Wong

poignant and powerful spoken word poetry, also known as "slam poetry" or "spitting." Her moving pieces, which are a mix of poetry, dialogue, and dramatic speaking, grew into a spoken word movement that spread across the campus and into the surrounding cities. Eventually, it took Wong to Arizona where she served as a spoken word artist for United Christian Youth Camp (UCYC) and now she is a full-time traveling poet.

When Wong first arrived at HIU, she was reluctant to get involved in anything on campus because she thought she was too different to fit in but all that changed once she started performing. People saw how meaningful spoken word poetry could be and it didn't take long for the practice to become a featured part

of the Hope community. "Underground writers started to surface, and people became aware of how important and effective their voices were," Wong said. "Open mics became more popular, benefit shows became expected, and a whole new kind of thinking flooded the campus: freedom in expression, freedom in worship."



and Spit in the Mud hosted a benefit concert at Eastside Christian Church in Fullerton for the local nonprofit group, Solidarity, and raised almost a thousand dollars. "I guess you could say, since none of the other movements (at Hope) fit me, I started my own," Wong said. "That's the beauty of a smaller school like HIU. Small communities are the perfect place to start a great movement."

Through her classes at *Hope*, Wong feels she was able to stretch and challenge herself even if she has some trouble nailing down a favorite class or professor. "The English Literature department on campus is phenomenal. Choosing a favorite course or favorite professor would be like choosing a favorite preposition -- there are so many

great ones and they all connect to different ideas in different ways," she said. "As I look at all I've written post-college, I can still pinpoint what classes have provoked certain creative tactics and intentional, syntactical flair."

Crossing the Killing Fields for Christ

t first glance, **Christopher LaPel's (MA '94)** life seems fairly ordinary. He loves God, is committed to serving the Lord, and is a leader of two dynamic ministries. "My heart just wants to share our Lord Jesus Christ," said LaPel. Make no mistake, though – there is nothing ordinary about Christopher LaPel.

Born in Cambodia, Christopher was a young man when the Khmer Rouge assumed control of the country and began executing people in what became known as the Killing Fields. His parents and siblings were among the over 1.7 million people killed by the Khmer Rouge and, though he was not yet a Christian, he believes it is only through the grace of God that he survived.

After accepting Christ and moving to the U.S., Christopher was committed to serving wherever God wanted him. In his heart, he knew he was called to be a church planter, so he founded the Cambodian Christian Church Organization (CCCO), through which he travels semi-annually back to the country where he lost his family, friends, and classmates, in order to preach about Christianity. While he admits it is emotional and



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difficult to return to Cambodia year after year, his trust in the Lord provides him with the strength he needs.

Christopher's faith has often guided him through challenges. In 1995, he ministered to and baptized a man named Hang Pin. It was not until 1999 that Christopher learned that Hang Pin was actually named Kaing Guek Eav, better known by his revolutionary name, Duch. This man had been the head of the Khmer Rouge's secret police and was believed to be personally responsible for the deaths of at least 14,000 people.

After Duch was discovered and imprisoned for his crimes, ten years passed before Christopher saw him again face-to-face. When they met once more, Christopher did not spew words of hate or anger. Instead, Christopher, a man who had barely escaped death at the hands of people like Duch and whose family had all been victims of the Khmer Rouge, looked Duch in the eye and said, "I love

original plans to return to California after the summer changed. "I'm not moving back," she said. "God changed the course of my ministry in Arizona, and my calendar is booked straight through December, I'm being hired not only as a poet, but also as a speaker for church services, and [as a] teacher for writing workshops. I'm working

Her desire to reach today's youth compels her. "I do what I do because I think silence and inauthenticity in our youth is Satan's ploy to steal a generation that belongs to the Lord. Through giving our youth a voice and encouraging them to be honest with their lives and with each other, we advocate for the importance of community and honesty, and the reality of the power of God's grace in our lives, she siad. "In a fast, intense, hip-hop-driven world, I preach the Gospel in a fast, intense, hip-hop-driven way. I have found a way to communicate to today's youth exactly where they're at, and I use the most effective methods I know of in order to point people to Christ. What I do sounds weird and unconventional to

a lot of people, but we need to get out of our small, traditional boxes and do whatever it takes to communicate to our generation; their souls are more important than our traditions."

While performing in Arizona, Wong was given so many opportunities to perform spoken word ministry full-time that her with amazing media teams and different churches, and have been blessed by all of the teens I've met who have shown me that spoken word in the church is more powerful and effective than I could have possibly imagined." Wong notes the idea of being a fulltime traveling poet sounds crazy, but she says, "it turns out, God calls us to do crazy things."

That belief is something Wong discovered while she was at HIU and it's something she hopes others will come to know, as well. Her commitment to spreading spoken word poetry both on- and off- campus dominated her final two years at HIU, but she says she would not change those two years for anything. "It took a lot of time, hard work, and sacrifice, but it was worth it -- it was most definitely worth it,"

she said. "It's the most amazing feeling in the world to be a part of something bigger than yourself."

you and I forgive you." He explained that forgiveness is never easy, but that we must love and forgive one another as God forgives and loves us.

Shortly thereafter, in September, 2009, his faith was on full display when Christopher was called to testify in court during Duch's trial. Though it might have seemed frightening or imposing to someone else, he was thrilled to have the opportunity to preach Christ's message to so many people at once. During his testimony, Christopher spoke for an hour and a half about Christianity and Duch's faith, while lawyers, the judge, and more than 500 spectators listened. "It was a blessing," he said.

In fact, it was only one in a series of blessings. After the story of Duch's conversion became international news, the Cambodian government began working more closely with CCCO. Since then, the ministry has essentially had an open door to plant churches that are officially recognized as Christian

organizations by the government. Neither CCCO nor Christopher is spending time worrying about when - or if - that door will close. Instead, they continue to work hard, taking Christianity to a group of people who, Christopher says, have never heard of the love of Christ or the goodness of God.

CCCO continues to grow and has already established more than 150 churches in Cambodia. Christopher is grateful for the many people and groups who support CCCO's ministry efforts, especially Golden West Christian Church, where he serves as a senior pastor. He also specifically acknowledged and thanked Hope International University, where he earned his Master's degree in Congregational Leadership. "Hope is a place where I was given the opportunity... to prepare myself to serve the Lord," he said.

He draws upon that preparation and the resources of his congregation regularly in his diligent work with CCCO. The organization persists in spreading the gospel, as the Khmer Rouge tribunals, which began in February 2009, continue. Christopher expresses mixed feelings on the topic of the tribunals, believing the trials serve an important purpose in "helping the Cambodian generation to learn right and wrong, but it won't give any healing or hope," he said. "That will only come from God."

MODEL UN TEAM IMPRESSES AT HARVARD CONFERENCE

" mazing." That is how the Hope International University (HIU) Model UN team described their participation in the Harvard National Model United Nations in Boston, MA, February 17-20. The team was composed of students Cameron Benton (BA '11), Heather Hicks (BA '11), Hughie Hughes (BA '11), Beatrice Krause ('12), Ryan McKinney (who won Best Dressed out of 1500 male delegates, BA '11), Tyler Patterson (BA '11), Cesia Rojas (BA '10), Jessica Ruf (BA '11), and Danny Sugimoto (BA '12). Faculty adviser Dr. Roberto Sirvent, Associate Professor of Social Science, and J.J. Peterson, then Director of Campus Ministries, also accompanied the group to Boston and were very impressed with the team's performance. "In a conference full of much larger schools, HIU stood out and received a lot of great praise," said Peterson. Other participating schools included Yale, Oxford, USC, and Dartmouth.

A typical day at the Model UN involves trying to get your team's position heard. This is accomplished through moderated and unmoderated caucuses. In the former, students focus on a specific issue within a larger topic. They speak in front of a large committee for 30 seconds to three minutes in an attempt to persuade them to agree with their viewpoint. Afterward, the committee moves back to the larger topic. In unmoderated causes, students negotiate, bargain, and compromise with other delegations in order to form a resolution to present to the committee.

"It was awesome to be able to compete on that level with some really great universities and enter into debates on some very difficult questions and issues affecting the world," said McKinney. Peterson and Sirvent said the team was very good at getting their resolutions pushed through; indeed, they once persuaded 15 countries to change positions and side with them. Ruf said that while other delegations had members that sat quietly throughout the proceedings, everyone on the HIU team was always prepared to speak and engaged in the topics at hand. At times, Hope (which represented the small African country Eritrea) was even approached by delegations representing big countries like China, the United Kingdom, and India, and asked to be allies.

"I could not be more proud of them," Sirvent said. "From my conversations with them, other students, and fellow faculty advisers, it was obvious that they were more prepared than many of their competitors." Something else the group agreed on was the importance of sending a Model UN team to Boston each year. "I definitely think this is a program that should continue every year," Krause said. "With the talent at HIU and the wisdom that comes from experience, we could easily have a team full of head delegates next year."

Sirvent believes sending a group to the Harvard Model UN is a great way to inspire students. "To have a team of HIU students competing with some of the best schools in the world at such a prestigious event is a clear indication that the University is producing "top-notch thinkers."

According to Hughes, the entire process was illuminating. "Hope definitely needs to have a Model UN team every year," he said, pointing out that the team noticed an improvement not only in their interpersonal communication, writing, and speaking skills but also their confidence. "At first, going into it, all of us were extremely intimidated because the most notorious universities in the world were there. By the end, however, we realized we could dialogue, debate, and converse with them. All of us, here at *Hope*, are just like them. We need to start believing that."



Tees for Poverty

ur story didn't really begin with a light-bulb epiphany, a voice in the wind, or anything exciting like that," said Tyler Patterson. Instead, Povertees began with a simple question: what does it mean to live and act out equality and justice?

In November 2007, **Patterson (BA'11)** and his friends **Trevor Smith (BA'10), Matt Donahue,** and **Gianna Persico** collaborated to answer this question. The result was an organization dedicated to raising awareness for and combating the effects of poverty. Smith explained that phrases like "Jesus loves you" are easy to say, "but how people live their lives determines if their allegiance is more than mere words – it is a lifestyle. Povertees [seeks] to embody this message." The group is known for taking food, clothing, and community to the streets of downtown Los Angeles.

Povertees became popular on the Hope International University (HIU) campus not only for their ministry but also for their unique t-shirts, also called Povertees, which are a solid color with a decorative pocket.

"The goal was simple," Persico said, "... to care for the poor through loving friendship and the distribution of food and clothing." The simplicity of the idea soon attracted other people, like **Hughie Hughes** (**BA** '11), who knew after one

trip to L.A. that he wanted to get involved with Povertees. The impact Povertees has had is evident in the way the members reminisce about different moments with their friends. When Hughes was leaving for a mission trip to India, his friends in L.A. made him a necklace so he would remember them. Persico recalls visiting one woman in the hospital and establishing a deep bond with her just by bringing in flowers and spending time at her bedside. Donahue happily remembers one man starting his own car washing business and being able to move off the streets.

One of Patterson's lasting memories with Povertees happened recently when the group was putting together an informational video. Louis, one of Povertees' closest downtown friends, was asked to do the voiceover. Patterson said many viewers have been struck by how powerful and evocative Louis sounds. It makes Patterson even more eager to get people involved in Povertees, so they can see for themselves how amazing the people in L.A. really are.

The video is just the first step the group is taking to expand their involvement and focus their commitment. "The work Povertees does is important because it provides for people's needs," Persico said. "More important, it seeks to provide holistic rehabilitation in order to rehabs, housing, and counseling, and to provide employment through the production of our shirts," said Patterson.

Everything comes back to relationships for Povertees because "it's so important to encourage a community between the rich and the poor," Donahue said. "Our love can't be limited to certain groups of people." The group is reaching out continually to the community with opportunities for involvement. Hughes and Povertees hosted a Create-a-Pocket party at HIU where attendees paid for the cost of the shirt and then used the provided materials to make their own unique pockets. They could even purchase and create a shirt to donate to the homeless. Hughes said the turnout was incredible with friends, family, newcomers, and even



to break the cycle of poverty. Instead of simply handing out food and clothes, Povertees seeks to attack every aspect of poverty in order to eliminate the problem for willing individuals."

For the past few months, Povertees has been reimagining its mission and goals and growing the ministry. From the apparel side, Hughes says that Povertees is a "clothing revolution" and is looking to expand its market by establishing an online store. Donahue said he would like to see Povertees help the homeless both domestically and abroad. To that end, the group has been working to legally establish itself as a nonprofit organization that is better equipped to meet the needs of the people it serves. "In the future, we are looking to provide connections Evan Longoria of the Tampa Bay Rays in attendance. Also at HIU, Hughes and Patterson headed up Sack Lunch Ministry where students were asked to donate one of their cafeteria meals and/or go as a group to downtown L.A. The value of the donated meals was used to pay for sandwiches, chips, fruit, cookies, and bottled water, which were packaged together and distributed on the streets.

There is an endless number of ways to support

Povertees: purchase and wear a shirt, volunteer to help make shirts or to take trips to L.A., and pray for God's continued guidance. As Povertees continues to go beyond the borders of traditional ministry to discover and fight the underlying causes of poverty, members urge people to help the organization and those in need by being examples of justice and equality in their own communities. Hughes said, "We encourage people to perpetuate change through the lives they lead."

hile attending to his myriad of presidential responsibilities, Dr. John Derry made time to teach business courses at *Hope* the last two semesters. He is currently teaching a senior level undergraduate course and a graduate level online course, and is enjoying the role of a professor immensely.

InsideHIU: Dr. Derry, we understand you have been spending some time in the classroom. How does it feel to be teaching?

Dr. Derry: I've always felt my calling is to college administration, but know that teaching is the reason we exist as a school. The best part of this experience is the opportunity to connect with students and I have really enjoyed that. This year is the first time that I've been able to work it into my schedule and I'm glad I did.

InsideHIU: What classes did you teach last semester and what classes are you currently teaching?

Dr. Derry: Dr. Woest, the Dean of the College of Business, asked if I would teach a traditional undergraduate class on *Strategic Management* and a graduate online class on *Board Governance in Nonprofit Organizations*. These were two totally different delivery models and also very different types of students.

InsideHIU: What do your students think of having their university President teach a class?

Dr. Derry: I got the impression that at first they weren't quite sure what to expect. But after a while they figured out I was a normal professor. My class evaluation came out very high. (Of course, I made sure to provide some nice incentives the day they completed the survey.)

InsideHIU: You've received a number of degrees over the years, including a bachelor's degree from Lincoln Christian College, a Master of Arts degree from Lincoln Christian Seminary in theology and philosophy, a Master of Science in Education from Western Illinois University, additional post-graduate work in educational administration, a Doctorate of Education from East Tennessee State University, and an Honorary Doctorate of Theology from Seoul Christian University. This, coupled with your

dedicated career in higher education, makes it clear that you are passionate about education. What is it that you appreciate the most about higher education?

Dr. Derry: I believe furthering one's education is not just a matter of opening doors of career opportunity. It also should be to enhance our professional effectiveness wherever we believe God is leading us to serve. We encouraged our children to do the same. Our son has two doctorates and our daughter has two postgraduate degrees and plans to complete her doctorate as well (with three small children and one on the way, she's put that on hold for a while).

To me higher education is critical to the future of our country and our culture. And when that education is Christ-centered it becomes a leavening influence on the world.

InsideHIU: What do you hope your students will learn from you?

Dr. Derry: I've shared personal experiences that relate to the topics covered in the course and really tried to emphasize practical application of what we are learning. I hope they acquire an appreciation for implementing sound business principles in whatever setting they find themselves.

InsideHIU: What have you learned from your students?

Dr. Derry: They are very open about their experience at HIU and I've been impressed with their appreciation for how the education here has impacted their lives. It's quite clear they value the relationships that are developed with faculty and staff, even in an online class.

InsideHIU: Do you think that teaching classes impacts your role as President of HIU?

Dr. Derry: Definitely. It has given me a valuable perspective on what our faculty members encounter every day. I have a greater appreciation for the challenges they face and a better understanding of the tools available to us. I think one of the most enlightening aspects of this is an awareness of the incredible technology that we have in place. For a small school, our online library resources, the online portal for every student attending HIU, and the Hopeonline programs are amazing.

InsideHIU: How long do you hope to continue teaching at HIU?

Dr. Derry: I assume as long as I can work it out with my schedule and as long as my course evaluations are favorable.

With the current demand on the higher education industry to offer practical instruction that prepares students well for their future careers, there is no doubt that Dr. Derry will continue to receive favorable evaluations. Positive student evaluations commented on the fact that he has such extensive, relatable experience in his professional background that he drew upon to deliver examples and real-life scenarios as he taught. Logical explanations aside, there is just something exciting about taking a class from your college President.



Childhood Lessons Grow into \$1.4 Million Legacy

ova Nelle Harris Liston's mother always gave her and her brother, Bill, ten cents for a treat after church on Sundays, but the siblings were required to give five cents of their treat money to the church before they were allowed to spend the remainder. Their mother taught them to "give to the Lord first," a lesson that guided Liston throughout her lifetime and led to a \$1.4 million bequest through her estate to Hope International University.

"The philanthropic spirit that Mrs. Liston inherited from her mother has resulted in a contribution that will provide scholarships to HIU students for many years," said Michael Mulryan, Vice President of Institutional Advancement.

Bill Harris, Nova's brother, has also demonstrated a lifetime of giving and played a significant role in his sister's support of the University. He is a longtime donor who has given tens of thousands of dollars in support of *Hope's* preparation of servant leaders and who established an endowment fund years ago. Four years ago, he encouraged his sister to join him in supporting *Hope* through The Harris, Liston, Sartain Endowed Scholarship Fund, which is named in honor of Nova and Bill's parents and inlaws and provides financial support to students.





"Nova was a lovely lady who enjoyed the thought of her funds being used to help young men and women through college and then going out to serve the Lord," said Dr. John Rowe, Senior Development Officer at Hope.

Bill and his wife, Trudy, said that Nova had a great love for Christian Higher Education and it was her sincere hope that her gifts would encourage others to give as well. Many of Nova's friends knew her as a "classy" lady who always thought of others before herself. Born in Lawrence, KN, Nova grew up in the nearby city of Leavenworth, where she met her husband Howard F. "Bud" Liston. Together, they traveled and lived across the country and the world, eventually retiring to Solana Beach, CA where Nova became very active in the Solana Beach Community Senior Center and served on the board of the Del Mar Heights Condo Homeowners Association. She passed away on September 4, 2010, leaving a legacy for generations of future Hope students.

"This is a perfect example of charitable giving," concluded Mulryan. "Both Nova and Bill were children who started by donating a nickel a week, and their generosity only grew and has grown throughout their lifetimes."

Darling Foundation Funds New iMacs for HIU Library

A New Development Where Campus & City Life Converge

Through an agreement with the City of Fullerton and California State University, Fullerton, Hope International University is positioned in one of the most exciting times of its history. HIU is on the brink of a new development of the land areas surrounding the campus that will unite campus and community life, bringing students, faculty, and staff together in a way that is more interwoven and dynamic than it has ever been.

This vision is CollegeTown, a place where campus and city life converge. The goal of CollegeTown is to foster greater connection with the Fullerton community by developing a University community without borders. It will be a place where students, faculty, and community members can live, work, shop, dine and congregate.

Michael Mulryan, HIU's Vice President for Institutional Advancement, stated that the University's involvement in the CollegeTown plans was a key factor in the recent decision to remain in Fullerton. "CollegeTown provides a synergy between our students, the two campuses, and the community. We're excited to be a part of the consortium with Cal State Fullerton and the city."

New land use developments include a pedestrian mall along Nutwood and new housing for students, faculty, and staff near the corner of Chapman and Commonwealth. Also envisioned along Commonwealth is an urban setting containing retail shops, dining options, and entertainment options such as movie theaters, bowling, music and an art gallery with rotating exhibits.


A new "front door" to both HIU and CSUF will be created that will entail closing down part of Nutwood Avenue and will integrate open spaces for the pedestrian mall and a public events plaza. This town square setting will feature food festivals, outdoor concerts, and art shows. HIU's Googie-style buildings on Nutwood Avenue will be refurbished both inside and outside, and the Pacific Auditorium will become a

state of the art facility and equipped to handle expanded events for both HIU and the community.

More convenient transit options will be created to foster better connectedness to downtown Fullerton and the rest of the community. A local trolley system connecting Fullerton destinations is envisioned, as well as convenient parking structures and on-street parking. The entire redevelopment will foster a greater sense of community by providing better pathways, bikeways, and natural gathering spots. More green space will also be woven into the plans.

The new development plan had its first public airing at a Fullerton City Council meeting in September 2010 and is now in a two year planning phase.

HIU is already known for its undeniable sense of community; the CollegeTown vision will only enhance our current community identity and sense of place.



ROYALS ATHLETICS

RECORD-SETTING YEAR FOR THE MEN'S BASKETBALL TEAM

L t was a record-setting year for the Men's Basketball team and Head Coach Bill Czech. Not only did the Royals log their highest number of GSAC wins ever, they also won ten more games this year than last, which is their biggest season-to-season improvement in 24 years. They put up a total of 14 wins, the most the team has ever had since joining the GSAC in 1999. Highlights like this earned the Royals a spot in the NCCAA National Tournament for the first time since 1994 and earned Czech the NCCAA West Region Coach of the Year honor.

Only two years ago, Czech came on as the men's coach after spending 14 years at Fullerton Union High School (FUHS), where he led the Indians to a total of 219 wins, the most in FUHS history. Since taking the reins at HIU, Czech has worked hard and pushed his team to excel both on and off the court, to great success.

This season, Freshman Jeremy Kilgore was named 2010-11 NCCAA 1st Team All-American. He also joined his teammates Sophomore Kris Rosales and Junior Orlando Collins on the NCCAA All-West Regional Team.



A fan at the NCCAA National tournament stated, "Rosales is by far the best point guard in the tournament. He makes everyone around him better." Rosales, who played high school ball at St. John Boscoe in Bellflower, CA, and helped the Braves reach CIF Quarterfinals, averaged 11.8 points and 2.4 assists per game this season. Against then NAIA No.2 Concordia, he put on a stunning show, racking up a season-high 24 points.

Kilgore, with an average of 14.8 points per game, led the Royals in scoring and increased his average to 20 points a game at the NCCAA National tournament. "Jeremy surpassed all expectations this season," Czech said in Gooszen's article. "He worked as hard [as] or harder than anybody at any given practice.

He worked exceptionally hard in the classroom, weight room, and gym. His jump shot was one of the best in the conference."

Averaging a team high of 7.3 rebounds per game, Collins nabbed a season-high 14 rebounds against Fraser Valley. Gooszen quoted Czech said that Collins is not only a strong offensive player but pulls out all the stops on defense too. "Orlando is all business," Czech said. "Works hard and does all the little things that help you win."

With all three nationally honored athletes and Czech returning this season, the Royals are likely to set more than a few records once again.

HIU ATHLETES Make a Difference in the Community

t HIU, we emphasize the idea of going beyond our campus to help others and impact the world for Christ. Our students regularly answer this calling and this past school year featured some fantastic service efforts from *Hope's* athletics teams. Here is just a sampling of the athletes' community outreach.

For the second year in a row, the Men's and Women's Soccer teams volunteered at Nicolas Junior High School in Fullerton. Players from the team took the students through different drills and lessons to help them learn how to stretch, warm up, and play. Then, the students were assigned to different teams to play against one another. During the fall, the HIU teams also volunteered with Janitor4Jesus, a non-profit organization based in Orange, CA that ministers to senior citizens and helps clean up their homes. In addition to clearing out materials from the house and cleaning, the players spent time ripping out carpet, throwing away old furniture, and cutting overgrown plants in an effort to make the home safer and more habitable.

Having seen the positive impact of the HIU soccer teams' volunteer work, Nicolas Junior High School, which lost its sports programs in 2010 due to budget cuts, instituted additional intramural programs and reached out for more volunteers. The Men's Volleyball team answered the call and players served as mentors to students during the intramural volleyball season this year. There are plans to continue this program next year.

The Softball team held two training clinics for kids this past year, the first with Orange County Regional Parks as part of Sports Day at Craig Regional Park; then, in April, the team worked with the Barstow Police Officer's Association and Police Activities League to host the Softball Skills Clinic. At both events, the team set up different stations to teach the kids in attendance the fundamental skills of the game. The kids were divided up according to age and then spent fifteen minutes at each station with HIU players, learning the proper techniques to hit, field, catch, throw, or run bases.

THE HOPE INTERNATIONAL TRIBUNE WINS NATIONAL AWARD



he Hope International Tribune, the student newspaper at Hope International University (HIU), placed fifth in its category at this year's Associated Collegiate Press (ACP) National College Journalism Convention (NCJC) held from March 3-6. The Hope International Tribune competed with schools from across the country and Canada as a part of ACP, which is described as "the largest and oldest national membership organization for college student media in the United States." There were reportedly 900 attendees and more than 100 schools present at the conference including Azusa Pacific, Biola, California Baptist, CSU Fullerton, Arizona State, and UCLA.

Opinion Editor **Beatrice Krause ('12),** Editor-in-Chief **Stephanie Coats (BA '11),** and Advisor **Beth Lee (BA '06, MA '10)** were all present at the award ceremony on Sunday, March 6. All three were excited to see the program's hard work and commitment over the years reflected in this national honor. They also acknowledged that the award meant HIU and its publications program are becoming known nationwide and capable of competing with public and private institutions around the country.

The group, joined by Copy Editor Kelly Guerrero and former Editor-in-Chief Jack Appleby, participated in workshops, critiques, and social gatherings throughout the conference. Lee moderated and Coats served as a representative, along with three individuals from other private schools, on a panel entitled "Reporting on a Private College."

Only five years ago, The Hope International Tribune was known as the Royal Decree and a handful of students were pushing hard to make the paper the best it could be. The Tribune's national placement at ACP has served as a source of pride and affirmation to alumni of Student Publications.

"Wow! The Tribune has come so far from when it was first published," Mike Taylor (BA '07), who served on the Royal Decree staff four years, said. "We always wanted the *Royal Decree* to be a respected, well-read student newspaper. To hear that The Tribune placed fifth is such a huge honor for those who worked so hard to get it there, for both alumni and current undergraduates."

Ashley Thompson, Kirsty Welch Henderson (BA '08), and Sarah Reed Womer (BA '10) were all on staff when the *Royal Decree* became *The Hope International Tribune* and they were each thrilled to hear the exciting news.

"I think it's long overdue!" Henderson said. "I was very blessed to work alongside so many talented writers and it's finally paying off." Thompson felt the same way. "I am not surprised to hear that [*The Tribune*] placed at ACP this year!" she said. "I am sure [*The Tribune*] will continue to improve and go on to win many more awards." She added that she hopes Student Publications continues to grow and impact the students and staff involved, but also the community.

"I think that this award is an amazing accomplishment that definitely took years of hard work to attain," Womer said. "With the help of past and present publication staff and, of course, the dedication of our mentor and guide, Beth Lee, *The Tribune* has grown into something we should all be very proud of. I am so honored to be called an alumna of this publication."

Nominations are received and reviewed by the faculty of the Pacific Christian College of Ministry and Biblical Studies and President John Derry. Cal, who earned his B.A. in Preaching from HIU and also holds a M.A. in Biblical Theology from Fuller Theological Seminary, has a long history with Hope. He, his wife Lisa (FS, 1976-1978),

President Derry agreed, saying, "The Ministry Hall of Fame is a reminder of the many ways HIU alumni are fulfilling our mission of developing servant leaders who have a major impact on the church and world. When I made the presentation to Cal at Central Christian Church, the congregation affirmed the dynamic ministry he and his wife, Lisa, have had in Mesa, AZ. The people really love and respect them."

Cal has served as the Senior Pastor at CCC since 1999, and first joined the church in 1986 as the Youth Pastor. He says most of his memorable experiences in ministry have revolved around seeing people and God do remarkable things. "Watching

> people reach way beyond themselves in faith to attempt and to accomplish what they didn't think they could do never ceases to thrill me," he said. "What God needs is for us to be faithful with whatever giftedness he has endowed us. God can do a lot more with 'little' than any of us can imagine."

The Ministry Hall of Fame portrays each recipient's service in a unique shadowbox that is displayed on the second floor of the Student Center on Hope's Fullerton campus.

The display gives viewers a small glimpse into that person's ministry. "The Ministry Hall of Fame is just a small effort to honor God by honoring His servants," Professor Alley said. "It is not intended to 'puff up' an individual apart from the work that the Holy Spirit is doing through that individual."

Cal feels the same way, and hopes that students who see him in the Hall of Fame are inspired to let God guide them. "If God could do something with me, imagine what he could do with you!"

EASTSIDE PASTOR GENE APPEL AWARDED HONORARY DOCTORATE FROM HIU

Spring Commencement 2011 at Hope International University (HIU) was certainly a big day for the graduates, but also for their featured speaker, **Pastor Gene Appel**, who was awarded an Honorary Doctor of Divinity at the ceremony.

"I was sincerely humbled by this gracious gesture by President Derry and Hope International University," Appel said. "It was an honor that really deserves to be shared with so many great people and colleagues whom I have served with over

the years. Everything worthwhile I've ever done, I've done as a part of a team."

After receiving the degree, Appel spoke to the Class of 2011 about making every day count. He joked that, since nobody would remember who spoke that day, he decided to share something close to his heart. Appel talked about his late father, who died when Appel was just 14, and the incredible impact his dad had on him. "In a brief 5200 days, he shaped my life," Appel said. "Life goes by so quickly and I wanted to

He calls this type of love "beyond me" and it was the main theme of his message in November 2010, when he was a featured chapel speaker at Hope (see page 5).
