In August, I shared some thoughts with our employees about a concept I call "Here, Now & Close," and I've had several say that this simple framework has really helped them personally and spiritually.

I've been doing some research on grief and the brain. Now that I have a deeper understanding of how our brain works, especially after loss, I believe there's a battle going on every day for us around here, now, and close.

God wants us to feel Him here, now, and close. So much so that he gave his Son, then the Father and the Son gave us the Spirit so that we would know we're loved. We're not alone. We're cared for, we're worthy of being loved, we're worthy of being liked. God desperately wants us to know and believe and experience Him here, now, and close.

On the other side of this battle going on every day is a lion prowling in the grass just outside of our vision, ready to pounce on us at every turn so that we have no here, we have no now, and we have no close; not just with our friends, colleagues, people in our church or our college or business, but also with our Heavenly Father.

It doesn't have to be some terrible belief that we're tricked into by the devil, by the adversary, by this lion that wants to rip us to shreds. Sometimes it's the subtle nudge to just isolate. You convince yourself you'll be better, you'll get more energy, you'll have better study time. You'll be more recharged if you go sharpen the saw. So take off a week or two or a year or a decade and just kind of be alone. Be insulated because your spouse would probably appreciate it if you took better care of yourself anyway.

There are variations of variations of lies that tell us not to be in connected relationships, I know it's hard to lead, especially the highest positions in an organization, and maintain a good group of friendships. It is. The power imbalance inherent in any leadership setting gets in the way.

There are these protective and normal, understandable issues and dynamics going on in any organization. I know it's tough to have friends as a leader, but you don't have to have your closest friends at work.

What I have come to believe and know in my heart is that the Holy Spirit was given to us to remind us every day, every moment, that in addition to friends and family, Emmanuel is ALWAYS here, now, and close.



In our tradition, we had a view that the Holy Spirit would help us from time to time. We did not have a tradition of signs and wonders and speaking in tongues. And so it got murky for a while, and I wasn't really sure what He does do for believers.

But one thing I believe is that we have underappreciated the role of the Holy Spirit in our lives. And in the last few months, my friends, I have been overwhelmed by the hereness and the nowness and the closeness of God. Yes, in my family, yes, in friend groups, but at least as much if not more, by the presence of the Holy Spirit in my life.

If you're lonely, if you've been struggling, I want right now to take just a minute and remind you that the literal name for Jesus is Emmanuel: God with us. And one of the names for the Holy Spirit is Paraclete, the One wearing cleats on the hill right next to us.

Jesus, in the middle of a long sermon, talks about the role of the Spirit. He says, "I will ask the Father and he will give you another helper, that the helper may be with you always and forever."

God wants to be in this with you and give you so much joy and so much power and so much confidence that you begin to engage other people and take some risks and start some groups and send out some connections and some offers to be with people. You spend less time alone and spend less time on your phone.

May God remind you that you are loved with an infinite love, and that love is so deep and so strong that it can withstand losses and criticism and critique and separations.

That love is so strong!

It propels us toward connecting with people so that we can restore relationships. So strong that we can get through periods where we are alone, when we are lonely.

God, we need your strength and we need the lion to take a hike!

Today I ask that we would engage in new behaviors, that we would be more connective and less escape oriented, that we would be more initiating and less retreating.

God, thank you for your Word. Thank you for your Spirit. Thank you for being Emmanuel. We love you. We thank you. We need you, Jesus!

Hosanna Wong ('11) is an international speaker, best-selling author, and spoken word artist helping everyday people know Jesus for real. Widely known for her spoken word piece, "I Have A New Name," Hosanna shares in churches, conferences, prisons, and other events around the world, reaching across various denominations, backgrounds, and cultures.

Born and raised in an urban ministry on the streets of San Francisco, Hosanna later packed her life into suitcases and traveled to churches and other ministries throughout the United States to share about Jesus through spoken word poetry. During those years without a permanent home, she began speaking and creating resources to serve the local and global Church.

She currently travels and speaks year-round, and serves on teaching teams at churches throughout the United States.

Hosanna never meant to attend a private, Christian university. She was raised by a father who had struggled with a heroin addiction and the gang lifestyle. When a man introduced him to Jesus, he turned from gang activity and addiction, and then raised Hosanna in a church that looked very different from those that most HIU students experience. They served in the streets and worshipped outdoors, with no stained glass or comfortable seats, and it was in those streets that Hosanna built the foundation for her current ministry, through which she preaches, teaches, and helps others know Jesus "for real."

"I learned spoken word poetry and hip-hop on the streets, and I never realized that those art forms could serve Jesus," Hosanna said.

Her non-traditional childhood meant that school was a struggle, because she didn't quite fit the model of a scholar. Still, her grades were sufficient to lead to multiple scholarship offers when it was time for college. She chose Hope International University, the only faith-based institution among her options, not because of the faith base, but because it offered her the biggest scholarship package.

Shortly prior to her freshman year, her father was diagnosed with cancer, and Hosanna did not want to leave him, but his desire for his daughter to earn a college degree persuaded her to move to Fullerton. Once she arrived, she planned to stay for a year and then leave, but her father lost his battle with cancer during her first year and, not really feeling like she had a place to return, she continued in her pursuit of higher education, ultimately declaring an English major. She struggled with her faith, feeling deeply wounded and confused by the church, but she found a stronger spiritual connection midway through her college years.

"I had met Jesus when I was very young," she said, "but, when I was about 20 years old, I realized that I needed my own relationship with Jesus, not connected to my father's relationship with Jesus."

That fresh relationship with God, combined with her English major, led Wong into mentorships with two professors who supported her in ways that profoundly impacted her life:

Professor Cora Alley, now retired as Chair of the English Department, and Dr. Natalie Hewitt, currently Dean of the College of Arts and Sciences. She said they always allowed her to be raw and honest, but demanded her best; she remembers that the "A" she earned in a grammar class with Dr. Hewitt was the hardest-earned grade ever.

"They supported my desire to use my art form to help others know Jesus," said Wong. "They pushed me to be excellent, to learn literature and writing in their more classic forms, and to express myself in written form. I wouldn't be a published author without them."

Hosanna also had a small group of friends who, like her, also found it difficult to relate to many other HIU students. She and her group of friends drove to Los Angeles on weekends, so that she could perform her work at slam poetry gatherings and other types of events. A lifelong friendship with her best friend, Kasey Martin-Lau (2011), thrived when they played tennis doubles in their senior year, and Wong is privileged to have performed Martin-Lau's wedding ceremony this past summer.


During college, she began ministering through spoken word, feeling convicted that she didn't want to wait until after graduation to start serving. Her friendships and L.A. experiences, in addition to the guidance of faculty members who helped her through a dark time of loss

and discovery, were all part of the growing realization that she really could use her talents to minister, but it took some time for her heart to soften toward the church as an institution.

She was prepared to teach English after graduation but was beset by invitations to work at local churches that summer, sharing her unique spoken word poetry. The girl who didn't feel like she fit in with typical congregations found herself living with pastors' families and that work grew into more than four years of traveling and ministering. Early in her travels, she met her husband, Guy Johnson, and they married two years later.

Hosanna has written two books, How Not to Save the World: The Truth about Revealing God's Love to the People Right Next to You, and the recently-published You Are More Than You've Been Told (Unlock a Fresh Way to Live Through the Rhythms of Jesus). Her husband, Guy, is a pastor and president of their nonprofit, Word on the Street Global. The themes of sharing the gospel with everyday people and authenticity in faith feature prominently in all of her words and work, and she continues to travel extensively, spending about 42 weekends per year, ministering in churches, conferences, and prisons.

Royals Bring Hope to Uganda

Alumni Sam Samanda (MA '21) and De Angela Smith (MA '19) went on a mission trip to Uganda, Africa, with their non-profit organization, Hope Women Empowerment (HWEO). Before the trip, HIU's Marriage & Family Therapy program faculty and staff worked tirelessly to gain monetary donations and sponsorships to supply essential resources such as food, housing, and education to the local community of Luweero, Uganda, along with the homestead villages for refugees This extraordinary collaboration and cultural exchange fostered hope and

positive change by contributing to the betterment of young female children and families in Uganda.

Poverty and inequality are persistent issues in many developing countries, often due to limited access to resources and opportunities. To eradicate poverty and promote sustainable development, it is crucial to empower women and girls through education and skill development and provide them with the necessary resources and supportive ecosystems.

HWEO works to provide a safe and supportive environment for young and adolescent girls in Uganda. HWEO focuses on reducing poverty and promoting sustainable development by addressing these girls' physical, educational, health, emotional, and spiritual needs.

To address the physical and financial needs of young girls, HWEO sports programs helps exceptionally talented girls secure half-bursaries in schools with sports programs. Games and sports activities are also used to

communicate key messages and raise awareness of girls' rights and aspirations.

HWEO goes beyond traditional approaches of securing donations. It involves universities, local schools, private donors, and social service organizations. Through these partnerships, the organization can address the needs of young girls.

For example, a summer mission trip included the Hope International University soccer team donating equipment and uniforms to the HWEO sports program.

In their efforts to serve the community through their nonprofit organization, Sam and De Angela continue to demonstrate the value of interdisciplinary collaboration. With the dependence on donations from the community and HWEO Uganda team volunteers, the organization strives to maintain a comprehensive and holistic approach at the residential home in Uganda.

HWEO provides educational support to female children, providing school fees, scholastic materials, and a safe

environment for previously abused and vulnerable girls; as well as a comprehensive care plan that includes monitoring, assessment, and evaluation of each girl's reintegration into their respective communities.

Entrepreneurship and skill building is in early development, along with training clothing alteration, bag-making, livestock sales, facilitating spiritual development and conducting Christian devotions at the residential home daily, and providing age-appropriate, biblically-based counseling.

De Angela and Sam resonate deeply with the principles and values that guide HWEO, such as "If one part suffers, every part suffers with it; if one part is honored, every part rejoices with it" 1 Corinthians 12:26.

Sam and De Angela are dedicated to advocating for young Ugandan girls' social and economic inclusion. Although it is challenging and the global community is aspirational and not fully realized, it is at the same time achingly beautiful to stand with God in complete agreement for social and economic justice.

WOMEN'S SOCCER: Under third year Head Coach Scott Dement, the Royals finished the season in sixth place with a record of 9-7-2, 3-4-1 GSAC. They qualified for the playoffs as the sixth seed and lost in the first round to Menlo. Sarah Ralston and Ryley Candelario were named All-GSAC.

MEN'S SOCCER: Coach Joe Lurker was named GSAC Coach of the Year as he guided the Royals to a first place regular season finish for only the second time in program history and first since 2014. Jesus Vargas was named GSAC Player of the Year and Dario Robles was named Freshman of the Year as the Royals finished with a record of 11-3-4, 6-1-2 GSAC. Diego Lopez and Willy Loredo Suarez were also named All-GSAC but the Royals fell in the first round of the GSAC playoffs to Vanguard. Vargas was also named NAIA All American Honorable Mention for the second time.

WOMEN'S VOLLEYBALL:

The Royals finished the year in ninth place with a record

of 6-20, 5-13 GSAC. Season highlights included a sweep of fifth place OUAZ at home and a 3-1 win over third place Jessup on the road.

CROSS COUNTRY: Emma
Timmermans qualified for the

NAIA National Championships for the second time placing 78th out of 326 runners. The men's team placed sixth overall at the GSAC Championships and were led by **Diego Pineda** who recorded the sixth fastest time in school history. On the women's side, Timmermans

finished 9th at the GSAC Championships to earn All-GSAC honors as the Royals finished fifth overall.

WOMEN'S BASKETBALL:

First year Head Coach
Jessica Case led the Royals
to their second ever GSAC
Tournament Championship
after they finished tied for
third in the regular season
with a record of 24-8, 13-5
GSAC. They got to the
Championship game after
upsetting Coach Case's alma
mater and No. 6 ranked
Westmont in the semifinals.







As a result they made their third ever appearance and second in a row in the NAIA National Tournament. Shiane Talley and Jeanette Fine were named All-GSAC and NAIA All-American Honorable Mention.

MEN'S BASKETBALL: For the eighth time in program history the men's basketball team made it to the NAIA Tournament after finishing the GSAC regular season in third place with a record of 20-12, 11-7 GSAC. They made it to the GSAC Tournament finals after upsetting second seeded The Master's in the semifinals but then fell to eventual NAIA fab four team OUAZ in the final. Jalani Horn and Sebastian Castro were named All-GSAC.

GOLF: Third year Head Coach Britney Sok was named GSAC Coach of the Year for the women after they won the TMU Spring Invite and Ron Streck Invite with Lily Rodriguez winning the individual title in both. The women's team also placed fifth at the GSAC Championships with Rodriguez earning All-GSAC honors and Day Martinez leading the way with a 9th place finish. On the men's side Troy Schulz delivered the Royals only individual title with a win at the Ron Streck Invitational. The men also placed seventh at the GSAC Championships with Schulz leading the way with a 10th place overall finish to earn All-GSAC honors.

MEN'S VOLLEYBALL: The Royals finished the year in last place with a record of 3-17, 0-10 GSAC. **Coby Prowse** led the Royals with 239 kills.

TRACK & FIELD: Teddy Ochieng qualified for the NAIA National Champions and set a new school record in the long jump placing 11th. At the **Outdoor GSAC Championships** Ochieng finished second in the long and Michael Ventura finished second in the 400m hurdles as the men's team finished 8th overall. The women finished 7th at the GSAC Championships with **Emma Timmermans** leading the way with a 6th place finish in the 1500m followed by a 3rd place finish in the 5000m. Timmermans also qualified for the NAIA National Championships and placed 9th in the 5000m. Timmermans also competed at the NAIA Indoor Track and Field Championships setting a new school record.

TENNIS: Maldini Simic was named GSAC Freshman of the year while Tiffany Beukes received All-GSAC honors as they helped lead the Royals to a 7-7 record and an appearance in the GSAC Semifinals after finishing the regular season in third. Simic was also named NAIA All American Honorable Mention and ITA Rookie of the Year. The men's team improved upon last year's performance as they finished in fourth place with a record of 7-10 and also appeared in the GSAC

semifinals. Lucas Ibarrondo Suarez was named All-GSAC.

BEACH VOLLEYBALL:
Candice Palmer was named
All-GSAC for the third year in
a row while Taylor Erickson
also received All-GSAC honors
as they helped lead the Royals
with a record of 8-8 including
helping upset No. 7 Arizona
Christian. The team overall
finished in fourth place with a
record of 7-15, 6-6 GSAC.

SOFTBALL: First year Head Coach Alex Mascarenas was named GSAC Coach of the Year after guiding the Royals to their third GSAC Regular Season Championship with a record of 41-15, 18-6 GSAC. Allie Puente was named GSAC Pitcher of the Year as well as NAIA and NFCA All-American First Team as she led the NAIA with 394 strikeouts and an ERA of 0.60 to with a 30-5 record. Puente helped put the Royals one win away from their first even NAIA World Series appearance as they made it to the Championship game in the San Antonio bracket, falling to No. 2 ranked Our Lady of the Lake. Makenna O'Toole, **Emily Puente, Emma McCraw,** Kassie Puente, Makenna Stuart and Jaylyn Hernandez also earned All-GSAC honors.

BASEBALL: Larry Mahoney, in his second year as head coach led the Royals to a record of 33-11, 19-5 GSAC as they finished in second place behind eventual NAIA National Champions Westmont. As a

result the Royals received a berth in the NAIA National Championship for the fifth time in program history, but fell as the top seed in the Lewiston bracket. Max Jung Goldberg was named GSAC Player of the Year and **Hector** Garcia was named GSAC Pitcher of the Year. Garcia and Jung-Goldberg also received NAIA All-American Honorable Mention honors, while Garcia became the fourth Royal and first under coach Mahoney to be drafted when he was selected by the Minnesota Twins. Omar Veloz, Robert Mattei, David Rivera, Matthew Pinal and Connor Martin received All-GSAC honors.

COMPETITIVE DANCE:

The HIU Dance program placed second at the Midland Invitational and second out of ten teams at the Southwest National Qualifier. They then competed at the NDA National Championships where they brought home the NDA National Championship in the Hip Hop category placing first out of six teams.

STUNT: In their second year led by Head Coach Kori Johnson, the Royals went 13-10 and advanced to the NAIA Championships where they finished as the third best team in the country. Kamea Binnquist and Jasmine Rincon received CSCA All American First Team honors, while Nicole Contreras, Angelina Castanon and Jamie Goldman received Second Team honors, and Amaya Quintero received Honorable Mention honors.

Nearly 400 HIU alumni and friends gathered in the Grand Ballroom of the Disneyland Resort Hotel last Spring for an elegant evening of celebration, inspiration, and philanthropy. The 2023 program highlighted HIU's global impact, and honored individuals and organizations that fulfill HIU's mission to impact the world for Christ.

HIU President, **Dr. Paul H. Alexander ('84, '88)**, delivered the keynote address and presented HIU's highest honor, The Spirit of Hope Award, to **Gene Appel**, Senior Pastor of Eastside Christian Church based in Anaheim, CA. Appel shared a moving and poignant message of the importance and urgency of HIU's mission.

Current HIU seniors **Daunte Ferguson** (**'23)** and **Surie Camacho** (**'23)** each shared personal stories of how God led them to Hope, provided the financial assistance necessary for them to attend, and how HIU has impacted their faith and prepared them for life. Ferguson, who is from the Omaha area, started his college career at Nebraska Christian College. He is a Worship Arts major and plans to pursue a graduate degree in Spiritual Formation while serving in full-time ministry. Camacho, whose family is from Nicaragua, is a Business Management major. She has been accepted

into an MBA program in Europe and plans to start her own business-as-mission. Both students thanked donors for giving to support student scholarships, making it possible for them to afford HIU.

Student emcees for the 2023 gala included **Brannan Williams ('23, '25)**, who grew up in China, and **Lisanne Siebrecht ('23)**, a native of Germany.

Distinguished Alumni Awards were presented to Roger Fletcher ('77 NCC), Jed ('99) & Renee Gourley ('99), Doug Kallestad ('87), Chris ('84, 86) & Carole McKinney ('83, '12), and Jessica Vance ('14). 

"I knew I was in the right place!"

Dr. Natalie Hewitt (BA '02), HIU's new Dean of the College of Arts and Sciences (CAS), arrived at then-Pacific Christian College as a freshman, absolutely confident that she belonged. A church leader from Dinuba Christian Church, in California's Central Valley, had introduced her father to Christianity, and Natalie spent her youth growing in that congregation. PCC alumnus Jon Kile (BA '92), pastor of the Dinuba church, and his wife, Tiffany (BA '92), were her mentors, and that relationship led her to PCC.

She entered college on a President's Scholarship as a member of the music group Ecclesia. The blending of her love for music and the Bible somehow led her to major in English, which makes perfect sense to Dr. Hewitt.

"Ministry touches people with the story of Jesus Christ," she explained, paraphrasing John 3:21, "and that message holds up in the Humanities, through other voices, letting the truth do its work."

She became friends with her future husband, Jay Hewitt (BA '03), when they both served as resident assistants on campus in 2000-2001. They began dating in 2001 and married in 2003; they are the parents of one daughter, Hero.

After graduating, Natalie taught freshman English at Whittier Christian High School. A born teacher, she was surprised when she resigned from Whittier to accept the Residence Life Coordinator staff position at HIU, and the high school principal asked if she'd be willing

to stay on in an administrative position.

"I was 25 years old and he said, 'Don't you know this is your gift?'" she laughed. "It was a foreshadowing of what would happen later."

She completed her Master's degree in English Literature at University of CA, Irvine, and began teaching Remedial English at HIU on an adjunct basis, at the invitation of longtime Department Chair Cora Alley. Just as she completed her Master's degree, she was offered a full-time faculty position. She was tasked to develop an inhouse English major, as English major programs were completed through a partnership agreement with neighboring California State University, Fullerton.

HIU and Claremont Graduate University (GCU) matched tuition for Natalie to enter CGU's Ph.D. program, which she completed in 2013, the same year that Jay and Natalie planted the Friends Church in Orange.

She became Chair of the HIU English Department in 2019 and Associate Dean of the College of Arts and Sciences in 2021, after demonstrating her administrative leadership skills as HIU's Accreditation Liaison with the Western Association of Schools and Colleges. She accepted the Dean position this year, when the former Dean, Dr. Steve Edgington, accepted the position of Vice President for Academic Affairs.

Dr. Hewitt is thrilled by the opportunity and by the caliber of her peers in the College.

"We have an incredible faculty team," she said. "I look up to them, admire, and respect them."

The University Administration is pleased to have the Dean position filled by a faculty member who has already demonstrated her value to the institution and its students.

"Dr. Hewitt has been an exemplary classroom professor, department chair, and faculty colleague in the College of Arts and Sciences," said Dr. Edgington. "She is well-respected by faculty and has already provided forward-looking leadership as Associate Dean over the last two years. No one is better qualified to lead CAS into the future."

Her journey has not been without challenges. She lost her mother to cancer, and her husband, Jay, who serves on the pastoral staff at Yorba Linda Friends Church, was diagnosed with brain cancer, for which he has received intensive treatment and regular scans.

Natalie radiates faith and hope, and is honored by the privilege of God's guidance as she mentors and teaches. She is happy with the department's progress with the in-house English major and even feels blessed when she must, on occasion, administer discipline.

"I am overwhelmed with the way the Holy Spirit has communicated and ministered through my career," she said.

"God is really funny..."

Dr. Joyce Yang, who recently stepped into the Dean's position for the Hope International University College of Education (COE), said that career change has never been difficult for her.

"When it's time to move on, I try to lay down what I want to do so I can do what God wants," she explained. "Every time I am at the point of change, I pray for just one offer, and God is really funny... I think he knows that I would struggle with the decision, so my choice becomes very clear!"

Dr. Yang was raised in Chicago, part of a strong, Korean, Christian family, in the Christian Missionary Alliance denomination, and several of her uncles are pastors. She became a Christian at the age of 16, but said that she did not actually experience the Lordship of Christ until she grappled with the concept in college.

She began her bachelor's degree with an art major, but switched to education after a spiritual gifts assessment identified teaching and administration as good options. She earned her Bachelor of Science degree in Elementary Education from the University of Illinois Champaign-Urbana; her Master of Science degree in Education and Social Policy from Northwestern University, in Evanston, IL; and her Doctor of Education degree from California State University, Fullerton.

Her broad experience includes teaching in charter and public schools, education administration, consulting, and human resources in Northern California and Minnesota.

Her work in Christian higher education began at nearby Biola University. Most recently, Dr. Yang served as Coordinator for the Teacher Induction Program for the Orange County Department of Education, and she applied for the HIU position at the recommendation of a friend who is an adjunct professor, an experience that reminded her, once again, of divine intervention in her career journey.

"I had already applied for another job that seemed perfect when I interviewed with President Paul Alexander," she said, "but I felt totally at home when we talked, and I just knew I belonged here... and I also knew that I wouldn't have learned a thing at that other job."

Dr. Steve Edgington, Vice President for Academic Affairs, expressed a great sense of anticipation regarding Dr.

Yang's ability to build upon the College of Education's advancement under the leadership of Dr. Doug Domene, who recently retired after seven years at HIU.

"She brings a wealth of experience in K-12 education as a teacher and administrator in public schools, as well as experience in teacher education and preparation at the university level," he said. "We're looking forward to Dr. Yang continuing to lead COE along that path, enlarging its influence and effectiveness in preparing outstanding classroom teachers and school administrators."

The idea of creating a teacher induction pipeline at HIU is what most excites Dr. Yang about her new position. Teacher induction is a mandated two-year process for teachers who have earned a preliminary credential. New teachers are mentored in the practical aspects of teaching and are mandated to complete two inquiry projects. These projects require the teachers to identify issues in their own classrooms and then utilize California state teaching standards to address them. They present their work to a panel, which then determines the completion of a clear teaching credential.

"HIU is the perfect place to launch a teacher induction pipeline," she said. "This environment is ideal for many teachers, and I'm especially thinking about charter schools and private schools."

She knows that HIU is a place where students are supported and equipped and wants to use that to create an induction pipeline to forge an even stronger community of teachers, helping to prepare new teachers for the realities of the classroom.

"They must learn to balance, " she said. "Five years after beginning their careers, 50% of teachers have left the field; we must fully prepare new teachers to persevere."

She also looks forward to the development of new programs in counseling and special education. In her personal life, Dr. Yang loves to travel and spend time with her family: her husband, Jim, her son, Payton, and her daughter, MacKenzie.

She also gives credence to the need for educators to develop a healthy work/life balance when she confesses her affection for watching Korean television dramas while walking on the treadmill.

CLASSROOM EXCELLENCE

Melissa Nuno, Kinesiology

Melissa Nuno, Assistant Professor of Kinesiology, was honored with the 2022-2023 "McReynolds Faculty Excellence Award," given each year to an HIU full-time faculty member who exemplifies teaching-learning excellence in the undergraduate classroom. Presented during the Honors Convocation Chapel each Spring, this award includes a plaque for the recipient to keep, the inscription of their name on a perpetual plaque which displays the names of each recipient year by year, and a generous cash award. Nominations were sought from faculty and students and, based on those nominations, a final choice was made by the prescribed selection committee.

Professor Nuno was commended by students and peers for her painstaking course design and class preparation, for engaging students in the classroom and getting students engaged in their own learning. "She always finds interesting ways to present and

explain material well, get students actively involved in classroom learning, and relate what is being learned to practical applications," stated one recommendation. "She fuels and honors students' curiosity and cultivates their hunger to learn."

Dr. Paul McReynolds is beloved by several generations of students who learned New Testament from him at Pacific Christian College from the 1960s to the 1990s. Dr. McReynolds was famous for his patient, gracious teaching in Biblical Studies classes and his published Greek/English Interlinear New Testament, with which many of you have become familiar. He was also deeply committed to the teaching and learning process. He is commonly known to his students simply as "Dr. Paul."

When "Dr. Paul" retired, he funded the Faculty Excellence Award in the names of his parents, Rose B. and Edgar B. McReynolds.





was led to write faith-based picture books after teaching kindergarten and first grade




